

College in the High School:

Exposure, Experience, and Preparation

During the 2019-2020 academic year, Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, and University of Washington:

- ▶ Partnered with **259** public and private Washington high schools to offer College in the High School (CiHS) courses statewide.¹
- ▶ Offered **159** courses.²
- ▶ Trained and supported **854** high school instructors to teach CiHS courses offered by a public four-year university.
- ▶ Registered **14,181** students to earn college credit.³
- ▶ Completed **19,469** registrations, which includes all course registrations per student.
- ▶ Awarded students **97,363**⁴ quarter college credits.⁵

Did You Know?

- ▶ All six of Washington's public four-year college and universities accept college credit earned through CiHS programs.
- ▶ Most in-state and out-of-state, but not all institutions of higher education, recognize the credit.
- ▶ This model provides high school students with the opportunity to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously by taking an official college course, taught in the high school by a university-approved high school teacher.
- ▶ The University of Washington and Eastern Washington University are NACEP accredited, and Central Washington University is in the process of seeking accreditation.

1. The number of Washington high schools is not duplicative across the three institutions.

2. Courses are duplicated. Institutions may offer the same course.

5. The conversion of a quarter credit to semester credits, is a multiple of .67.
