12th Grade College Planning Checklist

Fall 2022

- Meet with High School Counselor: Check-in to make sure on pace for high school graduation and to meet college
 admissions. Determine what courses you may need to complete this year to meet both high school graduation and
 college coursework requirements.
- Continue to work hard and maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0. or higher.
- Learn about colleges and explore majors and careers. Talk with friends, family, teachers, community members and high school counselors about college. Attend a college fair or college visit session at your high school or in your community.
- Apply for college admissions. All Washington public, four-year colleges and universities are part of the <u>Common App</u>. This allows students to complete a single application for multiple colleges and universities.
- Gather documents and sign up for the FAFSA (federal financial aid form). The FAFSA application opens on October 1, but there are pre-steps to take to be ready when the application opens. Apply for your FSA ID (username and password) ahead of time and gather documents you may need. Here is more information.
- Attend a financial aid event at your high school or in your community to learn more about both federal and state financial aid and scholarship opportunities.
- Apply for federal and state financial aid. Complete the FAFSA application.
- Apply for scholarships. Explore college and universities scholarship applications and opportunities. Each college or
 university has dedicated information to scholarships through the financial aid webpage. Explore and apply for
 opportunities to finance your education.
- Keep involved. Continue to participate or try out extracurricular, sports, clubs, or community service activities.

Winter 2023

- Apply for college admissions if you have not already. All Washington public, four-year colleges and universities are
 part of the <u>Common App</u>. This allows students to complete a single application for multiple colleges and
 universities.
- Apply for federal and state financial aid. Complete the FAFSA application if you have not already.
- Continue to apply for scholarships. Explore college and universities scholarship applications and opportunities. Each
 college or university has dedicated information to scholarships through the financial aid webpage. Explore and apply
 for opportunities to finance your education.
- Meet with High School Counselor: Check-in to make sure on pace for high school graduation and to meet college

Spring 2023

- Hear back from colleges and universities. Receive your admissions decision and decide where you plan to enroll.
