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The Council of Presidents (COP) is the association of Washington’s six public baccalaureate degree granting college and universities. Introduction

A new law in Washington, [RCW 28A.600.287](#) (see [Appendix A](#)), requires Washington's public four-year institutions to report information about their College in the High School (CiHS) programs every year. This information must be sent to an organization that represents the presidents of public four-year institutions starting September 1, 2024.

In 2023, [SB 5048](#), College in the High School Fees and Funding, was passed. Before this law, students who took CiHS courses and wanted to earn college credit had to pay a fee, whether paid for by the student or the school district with outside funding. The new law removed this cost for public high school students, so now students attending public high schools, as defined in [28A.150.010](#), can earn college credit for free by enrolling in these courses. However, students can still decide whether they want to register to earn college credit.

The law also requires colleges to report information about the students taking these courses. This includes demographic data about the students enrolled, geographic data about the courses offered, data about participation rates and the amount of high school and college credit awarded, and whether students enroll in college after high school.

This report examines the CiHS courses offered by four universities in Washington: Central Washington University (CWU), Eastern Washington University (EWU), the University of Washington (UW), and Western Washington University (WWU) at public high schools. Our institutions offer many courses at private high schools, but these enrollments are not included because SB 5048 removed fees for students attending public schools only. Community and technical colleges also offer CiHS courses, and the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges produces a separate report for those institutions.

Sources of data

The Education Research and Data Center (ERDC) provided data on public K-12 student participation, credit awards, grades, college enrollment after high school, and student demographics. Due to the timing and method of data collection, it covers the years 2021-22 through 2024-25 for enrollment data and the Class of 2023 for completion data.

CWU, EWU, UW, and WWU provided information on the locations where courses are offered and the number of students enrolled. This data is more recent and includes four years of course information. Data from 2021-22 and 2022-23 shows enrollment prior to the new law, while data from 2023-24 and 2024-25 shows the impact of the new law.

Finally, CWU, EWU, and UW offered courses during all four years covered in this report, while WWU began offering courses in 2023-24.

Student demographics

The following data tables from ERDC show the demographics of students enrolled in CiHS courses as reported by public school districts. The student demographics reported include free or reduced-price lunch (FRPL) eligibility, gender, and race/ethnicity.

Free or reduced-price lunch (FRPL) eligibility

FRPL eligibility is commonly used as an indicator of socioeconomic status. The tables below show the number of CiHS students categorized by their FRPL eligibility and the percentage of eligible students out of the total. For comparison, the statewide FRPL eligibility for all K-12 students is also included.

After the implementation of SB 5048, the number of students enrolled in CiHS courses more than doubled compared to the previous year. While the number of students not eligible for FRPL increased at a higher rate, the percentage of students eligible for FRPL increased by 119%.

Gender

The tables below show the number of CiHS students by gender and the percentage of these students out of the total. For comparison, the statewide percentage of all K-12 students is also included.

When compared to the statewide K-12 percentage, the program continues to serve Asian and White students at a higher rate, while Native American/Alaskan Native, Black/African American, Hispanic, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, and Multi-Racial students are underrepresented.

Student outcomes

The data tables from ERDC below show the outcomes of students enrolled in CiHS courses offered by public high schools. The reported student outcomes include participation rates, award of high school credit, award of postsecondary credit at an institution of higher education, academic performance, and subsequent enrollment in an institution of higher education.

Participation rates

When students take a CiHS course, they have the option to earn college credit. Among the courses offered by both public four-year institutions and community and technical colleges, 31% of students in the Class of 2022 and 35% in the Class of 2023 chose to earn college credit. Fifty-five percent of the Class of 2022 and 58% of the

Class of 2023 who earned postsecondary credit did so through a four-year institution. With the passage of SB 5048, which eliminated the fees for these courses, we saw an increase in participation rates up to 60% in the 2023-24 school year and the share of students taking a CiHS course from a public four-year institution increased to 68%.

Award of credit

For students in a CiHS course, earning high school credit has remained consistent at 96%. Since elimination of the fees, the rate of earning college credit has decreased from 99% to 91%.

Academic performance and subsequent enrollment in higher education

The following four tables show student performance in high school, measured by grade point average (GPA), and indicate whether they attended college after graduating, based on their graduation year. Tables 12 and 13 include students who took a CiHS course, as indicated by their K-12 school records. Tables 14 and 15 include students who took a CiHS course, as indicated by their college records, while they were still in high school.

Table 12 shows that in each of the Classes of 2022 and 2023, over 28,000 graduates enrolled in CiHS courses offered by either a public four-year institution or a community and technical college at some point during high

school. In the Class of 2024, this number increased to over 31,000 graduates. Annually, over 70,000 students graduate from a public high school in Washington.

CiHS graduates in 2022 and 2023 had an average GPA of 3.22, while the average GPA for CiHS graduates in 2024 was 3.17. Based on state and national data sources, 61% of the Classes of 2022 and 2023 who took a CiHS course enrolled in an institution of higher education, compared to 55% of all graduates. Comparable data for the Class of 2024 is not yet available.

This table shows that students from the Classes of 2022, 2023 and 2024 who took a CiHS course for college credit had average GPAs of 3.48, 3.47 and 3.37 respectively. Their college enrollment rates were higher compared to all

graduates who took CiHS courses (see Table 12). ERDC is awaiting data from the National Student Clearinghouse for the Class of 2024.

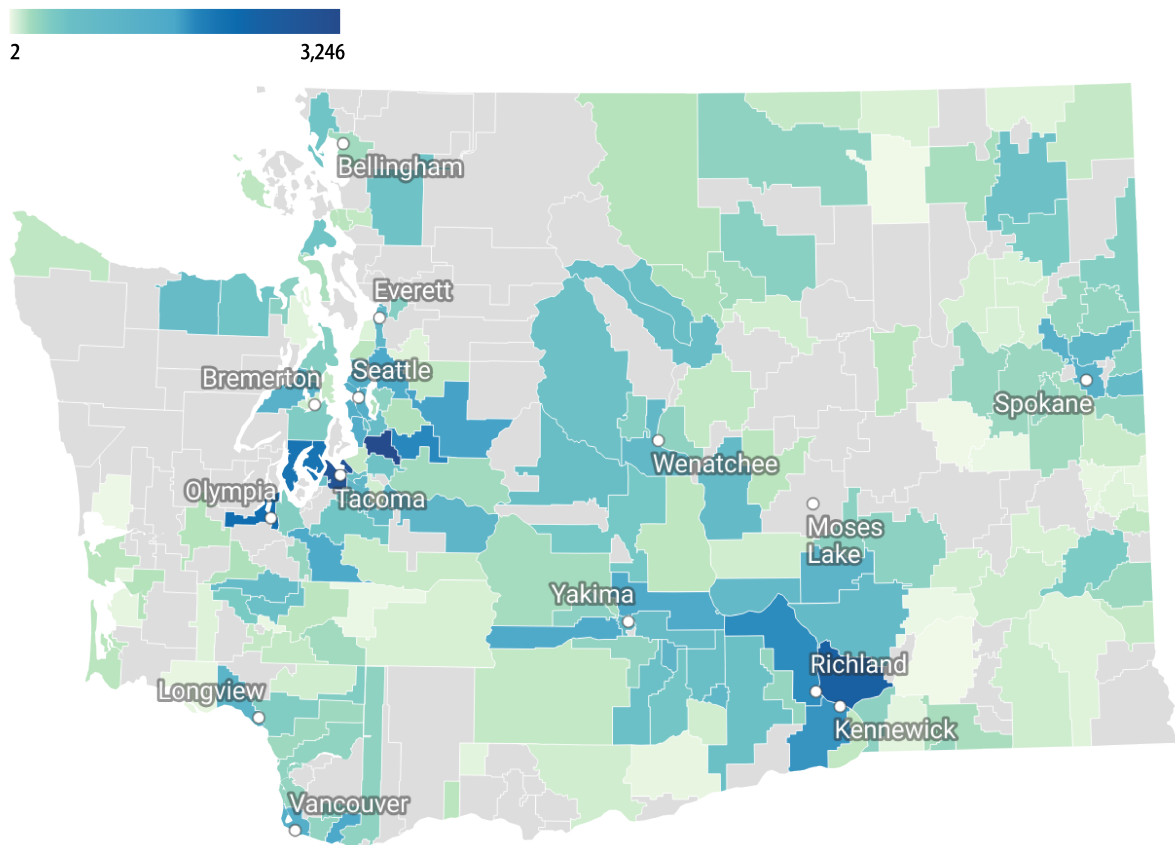

College in the High School course-taking maps

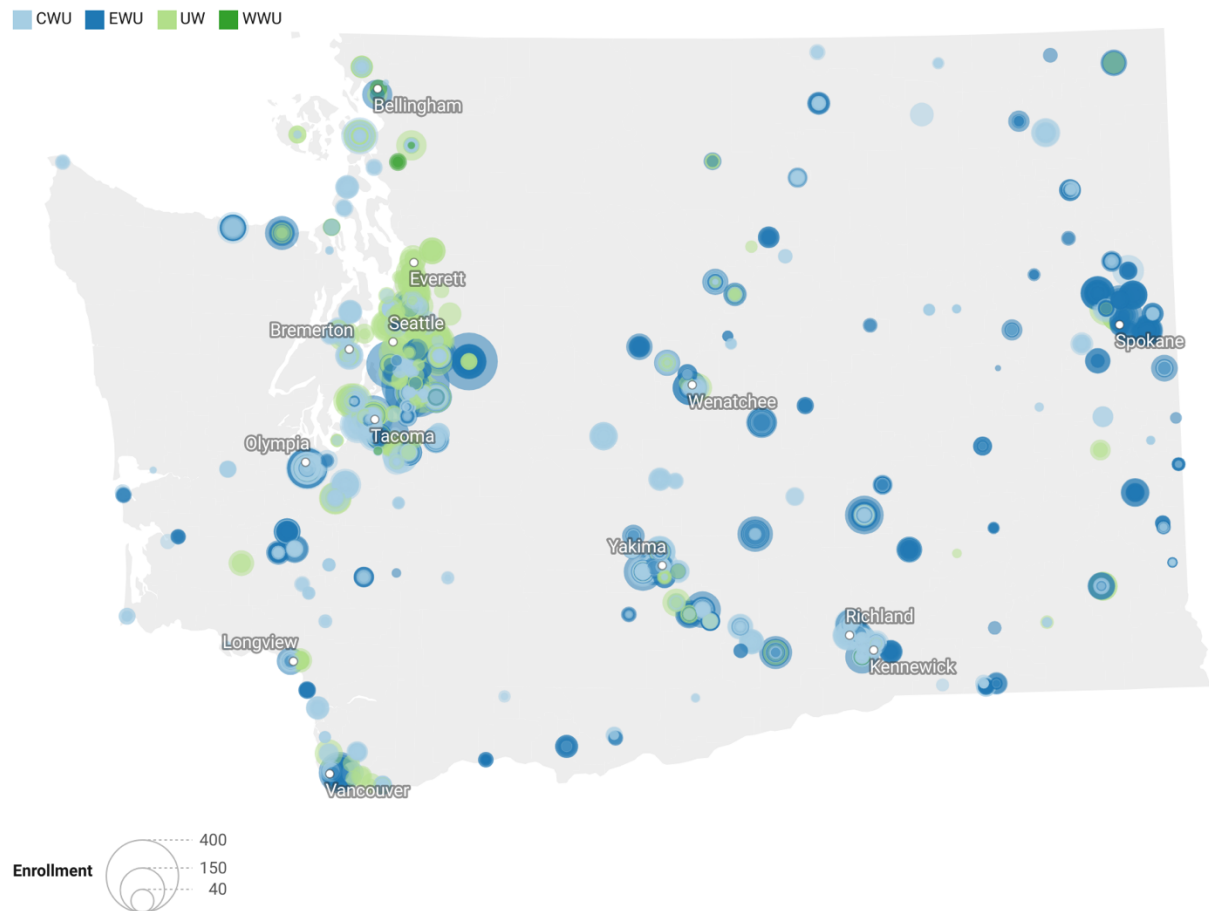

Recommendations on additional data reporting and disaggregation

Our only recommendation would be to change the due date for the report to align with data availability for the ERDC High School Outcomes report so college enrollment rates of CiHS students in this report can be compared to college enrollment rates of all high school graduates. Because of the timing of this report, college enrollment rates for CiHS students for the most recent academic year had to be limited to summer and fall after graduation instead of the entire academic year, as is reported in the High School Outcomes report.

Appendix A – RCW [28A.600.287](#) College in the high school program

(1) College in the high school is a dual credit program located on a high school campus or in a high school environment in which a high school student is able to earn both high school and college credit by completing college level courses with a passing grade. A college in the high school program must meet the accreditation requirements in RCW [28B.10.035](#) and the requirements in this section.

(2) A college in the high school program may include both academic and career and technical education.

(3) Ninth, 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students, and students who have not yet received a high school diploma or its equivalent and are eligible to be in the ninth, 10th, 11th, or 12th grades, may participate in a college in the high school program.

(4) A college in the high school program must be governed by a local contract between an institution of higher education and a school district, charter school, or state-tribal compact school, in compliance with the rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction under this section. The local contract must include the qualifications for students to enroll in a program course.

(5) Enrollment information on persons registered under this section must be maintained by the institution of higher education separately from other enrollment information and may not be included in official enrollment reports, nor may such persons be considered in any enrollment statistics that would affect higher education budgetary determinations.

(6) Each school district, charter school, and state-tribal compact school must award high school credit to a student enrolled in a program course if the student successfully completes the course. If no comparable course is offered by the school district, charter school, or state-tribal compact school, the chief administrator shall determine how many credits to award for the successful completion of the program course. The determination must be made in writing before the student enrolls in the program course. The awarded credit must be applied toward graduation requirements and subject area requirements. Evidence of successful completion of each program course must be included in the student's high school records and transcript.

(7) Each institution of higher education offering college in the high school must:

(a) Award college credit to a student enrolled in a program course and provide evidence of completion of each program course on the student's college transcript;

(b) Grant undergraduate college credit as appropriate and applicable to the student's degree requirements; and

(c) Provide course equivalencies for college in the high school courses and policy for awarding credit on the institution's website.

(8)(a) A high school that offers a college in the high school program must provide general information about the program to all students in grades eight through 12 and to the parents and guardians of those students.

(b) A high school that offers a college in the high school program must include the following information about program courses in a notification to parents and guardians of students in grades eight through 12, including by email and in beginning of the year packets, and in the high school catalogue or equivalent:

(i) There is no fee for students to enroll in a program course for high school credit or for students to enroll in a program course for both high school and college credit; and

(ii) A notification that enrolling in a program course for college credit automatically starts an official college transcript with the institution of higher education offering the program course regardless of student performance in the program course, and that college credit earned upon successful completion of a program course may count only as elective credit if transferred to another institution of higher education.

(9) Full-time and part-time faculty at institutions of higher education, including adjunct faculty, are eligible to teach program courses.

(10) The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules for the administration of this section. The rules must be jointly developed by the superintendent of public instruction, the state board for community and technical colleges, the student achievement council, and the public baccalaureate institutions. The association of Washington school principals must be consulted during the rules development. The rules must outline quality and eligibility standards that are informed by nationally recognized standards or models. In addition, the rules must encourage the maximum use of the program and may not narrow or limit the enrollment options.

(11)(a) State universities, regional universities, and the state college, as defined in RCW [28B.10.016](#), offering college in the high school courses shall coordinate with an organization representing the presidents of the public four-year institutions of higher education, and the community and technical colleges offering college in the high school courses shall coordinate with the state board for community and technical colleges to each prepare a report, each disaggregated by institution of higher education, that includes:

(i) Data about student participation rates, award of high school credit, award of postsecondary credit at an institution of higher education, academic performance, and subsequent enrollment in an institution of higher education;

(ii) Geographic data on college in the high school courses, including the name, number, location of courses, and student enrollment disaggregated by school districts and high schools;

(iii) Data on college in the high school student demographics, including race, ethnicity, gender, and receipt of free or reduced price lunch; and

(iv) Recommendations on additional categories of data reporting and disaggregation.

(b) Beginning September 1, 2024, and each year thereafter, the reports must be submitted to the appropriate committees of the legislature in accordance with RCW [43.01.036](#).

(12) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this section , unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(a) "Charter school" means a school established under chapter [28A.710](#) RCW.

(b) "High school" means a public school, as defined in RCW [28A.150.010](#), that serves students in any of grades nine through 12.

(c) "Institution of higher education" has the same meaning as in RCW [28B.10.016](#), and also means a public tribal college located in Washington and accredited by the northwest commission on colleges and universities or another accrediting association recognized by the United States department of education.

(d) "Program course" means a college course offered in a high school under a college in the high school program.

(e) "State-tribal compact school" means a school established under chapter [28A.715](#) RCW.
